## Coffee in the Moshi Region

The centre of the Tanzanian coffee industry is in the town of Moshi. Eight of the Fund's ten sponsored students live



and attend schools in this district. The first coffee grown in this area was planted at the nearby Kilema Roman Catholic Mission in 1898.

By 1925 one hundred tonnes were being produced each year. In that same year the Chagga planters formed the Kilimanjaro Native Planters' Association. This was the first of several Tanzanian coffee cooperatives, which enabled planters to sell directly to London markets and gain a better price.

The Coffee Board is located in Moshi where coffee from all over Tanzania is sold at auction to international buyers. Smallholders, those owning less than two hectares, represent 80% of the Tanzanian coffee production. The coffee bushes grow under the taller banana palms which provide shade.

## The KLSF ... thinking ahead

The aim of the Scholarship Fund is to continue to pay the students' education fees until the youngest student, Gloria, completes Secondary School in eight years from now.

Should the need arise, my son Fergus, with help and advice from his brother Patrick, would continue the good work. They are both educators; have travelled to Africa with me to meet each of the ten sponsored students and their families and are already familiar with all aspects of the *KLSF*. They love Tanzania and its people as much as I do. So the future of the Fund is assured.
